


As we support Comic Relief on Friday 18th March, we invite the children to attend school dressed up in red and to give a donation towards this great charity. Thank you in advance!


Our annual much-anticipated Scholastic Book Fair makes its return to our school during our book month of March!

Unfortunately, we continue to receive complaints about how some parents and carers continue to drive and park in an unsafe manner around our school premises at the beginning and end of each day. Please ensure

The residents of Moorland Road have also written to school recently to ask for our support in reminding parents and carers that their road is private and that use of their road at any time is unauthorised, as only residents or services have a right of access. We ask that you respect this and other residents who live local to our school sites.

Covid-19 update



Although COVID-19 remains a risk to us all, we continue to be experiencing fewer cases across our school community, which is positive. In light of the latest guidance from the government Covid-19 response 'living with Covid', we continue to be as vigilant as we can

in reducing the spread of the virus. Please see attached to this newsletter a letter from David Regan, (Director of Public Health for Manchester) which supports us in following advice to ensure that:

- If your child is showing symptoms of coronavirus they stay at home, and you book a PCR test for them.
- If your child tests positive, they stay at home and isolate for the required period. Keeping your child at home if they are showing symptoms or have tested positive, is key to reducing the spread of infection and protecting others in the community.

E-Safety Top Tips from Miss Duffy

 Learn your way around - Most devices have controls to ensure that kids can't access content you don't want them to. Make sure your "in-app" purchases are disabled to avoid nasty surprises. Check out the <u>Parent's</u> <u>Technology Guide at the UK Safer Internet</u> <u>Centre</u> for more help.



- E-Safety on Tablets Tablets are really popular with younger children, and the market has several which are geared specifically towards delivering child friendly content. When it comes to using them, start slowly: only download games and apps you have checked out carefully and steer them towards age targeted content such as <u>BBC iPlayer</u> Kids or YouTubeKids.
 - Sites like <u>www.net-aware.org.uk</u> and or <u>www.commonsensemedia.org</u> also provide useful advice.
- 3. E-Safety on Mobile Phones/Smartphones If you have older children, the focus will probably be shifting from tablets to smaller and more portable mobile devices: phones. The old online safety messages about having your home computer in a communal place become defunct, because phones are literally mobile computers and can do pretty much the same stuff that traditional desktop PCs can. You can use tools like Google Family Link for Android devices, or Screen Time for Apple iOS devices, to set up controls around usage, but it's just as important, if not more so, to talk to kids about what they should and shouldn't be doing.

4. Social Media Platforms - Ofcom's research also shows that YouTube remains a firm favourite. Children between five and 15 are more likely to use YouTube than other ondemand services such as Netflix, or TV channels including the BBC and ITV. WhatsApp has also grown to join Facebook, Snapchat and Instagram as one of the top social media platforms used by children. We've produced checklists for Facebook, Twitter, Instagram, Snapchat, Roblox and TikTok that you can download from this social media checklists page. The checklists will help you to understand more about each platform, what information they use, and how to set privacy settings: they're a parent's social media survival guide!

Article 2 (non-discrimination): The Convention applies to every child without discrimination, whatever their ethnicity, gender, religion, language, abilities or any other status, whatever they think or say, whatever their family background.

Article 12 (respect for the views of the child): Every child has the right to express their views, feelings and wishes in all matters affecting them, and to have their views considered and taken seriously. This right applies at all times, for example during immigration proceedings, housing decisions or the child's day-to-day home life.

Article 13 (freedom of expression): Every child must be free to express their thoughts and opinions and to access all kinds of information, as long as it is within the law.
