

The Governing Body is required to hold a Register of Governors' Pecuniary Interests.

This is also an item on the agenda for every Governors Meeting, and if there is any item on an agenda in which a Governor has a direct or indirect business interest this should be declared for the minutes and the meeting should decide whether the Governor can take part in the discussion.

A Governor cannot vote on an item in which s/he has a pecuniary interest.




















Governors should declare:

- relevant business and pecuniary interests, any links they have with any body from which the School may wish to buy goods or services
- governance roles in other educational institutions;
- any material interests arising from relationships between Governors or relationships between Governors and School Staff (including spouses, partners and close relatives)

A person paid to work at the School is not regarded as having a pecuniary interest if his or her interest is no greater than that of other persons paid to work at the School.

The Register is held, and is open to inspection, because it is important for anyone involved in spending public money to be able to demonstrate that s/he does not derive a hidden personal financial benefit from any decisions made.
